Paliurus spina-christi	A deciduous shrub or small tree commonly known as Jerusalem Thorn. Pinky-white branches are downy when young becoming spiny as they mature and are covered with shiny green, broad leaves. In summer, clusters of small, star-shaped yellow flowers appear.	6087
Parrotia persica Bella	Makes a small tree of exceptional beauty, in autumn when its foliage turns a dazzling display of superb colours.	3756
Parrotia persica Persian Spire	A quite fantastic sight pinkish new shoots in spring followed by a stunning combination of green and purple edged leaves in summer.	3757
Parrotia persica Vanessa		3758
Parrotiopsis jacquemontiana	Another shrub for the plant hunter, Parrotiopsis jacquemontiana is not often found or offered for sale. Makes a large shrub noted for its unusual flowers and the glorious butter yellow of its autumn foliage.	3764
Parrotia persica	Fabulous autumn foliage of reds crimsons and gold, makes a small tree of spreading habit, easy to grow and not especially fussy but should not be allowed to dry out before establishing.	3765

Parrotia subaequalis	The Chinese parrotia. A very rare and much sought after tree much acclaimed for its glorious autumn colour display. Quite easy to grow and more drought tolerant than its related witch hazel family.	3767
Pachysandra terminalis	Very useful carpeting subject with attractive evergreen leaves and greenywhite flowers in March. Ideal for damp shady spots.	3773
Pachysandra terminalis Green Carpet	A good reliable grower with smaller leaves and bushier habit than the type. Makes excellent ground cover for damp shady spots.	3774
Pachysandra terminalis Green Sheen	Makes a thick low mat of evergreen foliage and as its name suggests its beauty lies in its highly glossy green leaves.	3775
Paulownia elongata	A gorgeous early bloomer Paulownia elongata has medium/large trumpet shaped light slightly violet pink flowers with delicate frilly edges. Grows best in a sheltered position.	5949
Paulownia fargesii	A most stunning large tree when in early summer the fragrant heliotrope like flowers appear.	3781
Paulownia fortunei	A rare and sought after tree. Grows some bit smaller than its more well known cousin Paulownia tomentosa, same large impressive leaves its flowers lilac white on the outside creamy white and heavily marked with purple on the inside.	3782
Paulownia tomentosa	This well-known species is often referred to as the Foxglove Tree as it is covered in dark purple foxglove-like flowers in spring.	3783
Pachysandra terminalis Variegata	Forms good evergreen mats of attractively variegated green and white fingered foliage.	3784
Paeonia delavayi	A superb shrub up to about two metres in height with handsome deeply cut leaves and big deep crimson cup shaped flowers with eye catching golden stamens.	3803
Perovskia atriplicifolia Little Spire	Very much a Perovskia but as the name suggests smaller.	3841
Berberis galacia	A rare plant in cultivation. Bright yellow flowers in late spring.	3870
Perovskia atr. Blue Spire	Beautiful feathery cut grey foliage and large panicles of lavender blue flowers in late summer makes this plant one of my firm favourites.	3891
Perovskia atr. Filigran	Lacy ferny dusky white foliage and usual blue flower spikes.	3892

Perovskia atriplicifolia Lacey Blue	Forms a bushy mound of fragrant grey-green leaves that bear spikes of lavender blue flowers.	3893
Persea americana (Avocado)	The well known Avocado. Though not a reliable fruiting tree in this country it does posses attractive large evergreen leaves.	3894
Perovskia Longin	Same lavender blue flowers and the same lovely satiny silver white of the young stems but more compact and upright than many other Perovskias.	3897
Petteria ramentacea	The Dalmatian Laburnum an unusual shrub from N Albania like a shrubby form of laburnum, bright yellow flowers in erect bunches during May and June.	3906
Philadelphus affinis Bouquet Blanc	Masses of orange tree scented, double and semi double white blooms cover this hardy, deciduous shrub.	3912
Phygelius rectus African Queen	One of the early cultivars and still most effective with its light orange red tubular flowers over a very long period of summer and autumn.	3913
Phormium rectus Apricot Queen	A quite outstanding plant smaller than most Phormiums with weeping leaves of a soft apricot yellow flushed with deeper tones of apricot. Margins of leaves striped green and bronze.	3914
Philadelphus Belle Etoile	This traditional deciduous shrub is justly famous for its sweet scented white flowers in June and July. Height 2m, width 2.3m. Hard prune after flowering for best results.	3917
Phormium Bronze Baby	With deep purple foliage and similar to P. tenax purpureum but with benefit of being somewhat smaller, with sword like leaves drooping at the tips.	3918
Philadelphus coronarius Aureus	Medium sized deciduous shrub with scented white flowers in spring, Sun or partial shade.	3919
Phormium cookianum Jack Spratt	Long evergreen, green leaves with a brown border and black mid-rid.	3920
Philadelphus Dame Blanche	Makes a smallish compact shrub with beautiful highly scented pure white semi double flowers during height of summer.	3921
Phygelius rectus Devils Tears	Flowers a deep red pink with orangey red to the tips.	3922
Phellodendron amurense	Older trees develop a corky bark giving rise to its name the 'Amur Cork Tree'. Attractive large pinnate leaves and low squat shaped tree.	3924
Phygelius Fanfare Coral	A very good introduction, compact growing and a good display of attractive coral pink flowers with yellow orange to the inner lip.	3925
Photinia fraseri Little Red Robin	A dwarf form of Photinia Red Robin but maintaining the features in perfect proportion to the larger plant. Slower growing so makes a spectacular low hedge or small shrub.	3926
Philadelphus Frosty Morn	Stunning double, white blooms produce a beautiful orange scent. The flowers stand out well against the dark green foliage.	3927
Photinia fraseri Pink Marble	Quite outstanding mix of coloured foliage red green cream combine in many shades all set off by the new leaves which are the usual bright red.	3928
Phlomis fruticosa Rougemont	An interesting subtly variegated sport discovered at a hotel in Devon and now held as part of the National collection of Phlomis at Foamlea N. Devon.	3929
Phlomis fruticosa	Jerusalem Sage' Introduced from Mediterranean region towards end of 1500's and long grown in gardens. Bright yellow flower whorls set against grey green clothy leaves.	3930
Phillyrea angustifolia	Not commonly available, this compact round bush is a member of the olive family. It has narrow dark green evergreen leaves, with small fragrant white flowers in May and June.	3932
Philadelphus Beauclerk	A medium sized deciduous shrub with deeply veined mid-green leaves. In mid summer the shrub becomes covered in orange scented cup shaped white flowers with delicate pink shading around the stamens.	3933
Philadelphus Buckley Quill	Not often encountered but quite distinctive with its quill like white flowers produced freely during June.	3934

Philadelphus delavayi	A large, vigorous shrub with large leaves that have a grey felt effect underneath. Flowers are heavily scented.	3936
Philadelphus Mrs E L Robinson	A beautiful shrub of medium size with extra large showy flowers with superb scent.	3937
Philadelphus Erectus	A small shrub and as name suggests of stiff upright outline, flowers small but freely produced and deliciously scented.	3938
Philadelphus Innocence	A lovely erect shrub with small leaves and a multitude of simple white flowers with a rich, sweet scent.	3939
Phillyrea latifolia	A very useful evergreen shrub with a dense mass of small dark green glossy leaves. In late spring it produces small white flowers followed after a hot summer by blue-black fruits.	3940

Philadelphus Limestone	A distinct and not commonly available Philadelphus with much charm in flower and fragrance. Listed as a threatened plant by Plant Heritage.	3941
Philadelphus Marjorie	An uncommon variety of Philadelphus, that during June and July produces an amazing display of heavily scented blooms of white double flowers.	3942
Philadelphus Microphyllus	Its name doesn't do justice to this charming small shrub, dainty leaves and small flowers with a rich scent.	3943
Philadelphus Mont Blanc	Single strongly scented flowers smother this small to medium sized shrub in the height of summer.	3944
Philadelphus virginalis Natchez	Wonderfully large white, lightly fragranced flowers bloom in the Spring on this very popular deciduous shrub. The dark green luscious foliage on rambling stems merge and flare. A dramatic looking plant which is easily trainable. A superb feature.	3945
Philadelphus Silver Showers	Quite special amongst Philadelphus masses of white flowers.	3946
Philadelphus Sybille	Not often seen these days, sadly appears to be one of those forgotten varieties that should I think be more widely planted with its lovely scented white flowers with purple stained centre on arching branches.	3947
Philadelphus Virginal	One of my favourite Philadelphus, with lovely large perfumed white flowers which cover this large shrub in Summer. Grows to about 3m in height.	3948
Phormium Jester	Medium sized evergreen forms a clump of sword-shaped leaves, Tall red flowers in summer. Plant in moist but not waterlogged soil in a sunny spot.	3949
Phlomis angustifolia	A good foliage plant with dark sage green leaves with slightly unrolled margins. Usual ample display of golden yellow flowers on stout stems during late summer.	3950
Phlomis Edward Bowles	A low growing evergreen shrub with large hairy heart shaped leaves. In late summer and autumn it has lipped yellow flowers. Likes a sunny well drained position.	3951
Phlomis italica	A lovely small growing shrub with silky white woolly foliage and clusters of pendant lilac pink flowers on upright stems.	3952
Phlomis longifolia	A delightful small shrub with white woolly stems, smallish green leaves and golden yellow flowers.	3953
Phlomis purpurea Alba	A delightful white flowered form of this excellent shrub, quite rare and certainly not commonly available.	3954
Phlomis purpurea	A very attractive dwarf mound-forming shrub with mildly toothed, sage-like glaucous leaves in opposite pairs. Emerging from the leaf axils in summer are whorls of purple-pink hooded flowers. Best in a well drained sunny site.	3955
Phlomis russeliana	Lovely deep green sage like leaves on tallish stout stems which bear masses of soft yellow flowers over a long period of summer. Also known as 'Turkish Sage'.	3956

Philadelphus Manteau d`Hermine	One of the smallest of the species a charming small shrub achieving a compact three foot or so. Fragrant creamy white double flowers.	3958
Philadelphus Minnesota Snowflake	A strong grower with highly perfumed double white flowers.	3959
Phormium cookianum (colensoi)	For all intents and purpose looking for all the world like a smaller and more lax form of P. tenax, main difference being in the yellow flower heads. Is the parent of a number of cultivars including 'Cream Delight'.	3961
Phormium cookianum Tricolor	A clump forming evergreen perennial with elegant arching narrow leaves striped green and creamy yellow with narrow red margins. In the summer more mature plants will produce yellowish-green flowers in large panicles.	6135
Photinia davidiana Palette	A very attractive evergreen shrub particularly when new foliage appears in spring and the leaves are streaked with white and pink tinge. Used to be called Stranvaesia davidiana.	3962
Phormium Duet	Good upright growth of pleasing green leaves edged with creamy white.	3963
Photinia x fraseri Super Red	An improvement on 'Red Robin' with the same attractive red new foliage.	3964
Phormium Maori Maiden	Tall, arching apricot to rose red evergreen leaves with a thin green margin.	3966
Physocarpus opulifolius Diabolo	One of those shrubs that attracts attention with its deep purple handsome foliage that contrast so well with the white flower clusters. Easy to grow in most situations.	3967
Phormium Pink Panther	Very eye catching combination of ruby red leaf blades with lipstick pink edges.	3968
Phormium Platts Black	Very deep purple almost black leaf blades, definitely one for lovers of 'black leaved' plants.	3969
Physocarpus opulifolius Lady in Red	Another attractive form, Physocarpus Lady in Red is noted for its coloured foliage the older lobed leaves a deep claret red and the younger leaves a vibrant red.	3970
Physocarpus opulifolius Summer Wine	A good choice for quick effect, soon makes a medium to large shrub with dark purple foliage which is covered in summer with a mass of attractive smallish white pink tinged flowers.	3971

Phormium Sundowner	Phormium Sundowner posses attractive bronzy red green leaves with an eye catching deep pink stripe.	3972
Phormium Yellow Wave	A good growing variegated Phormium with distinctive yellow central stripe, leaves long up to 2m long.	3973
Phormium tenax Purpureum	Use this hardy evergreen for shape and colour contrast in your garden. The purple leaves will eventually reach 8ft tall, and the plant will spread at the base up to 2ft across, Wind tolerant, prefers a sunny spot, avoid waterlogged soil.	3981
Phygelius 'Purple Queen'	Brilliant purple-pink flowers and a long flowering season make this perennial a must for every garden. Height 2m, width 2m. Plant in a sunny, well drained position. Hardy in all but the coldest areas of the UK.	3982
Phormium Rainbow Queen	A variety of colours. The leaf blades a series of stripes ranging from red brown, green and pink shades. Grows to about 5 to 6ft and would make stunning large specimen plants in large pots.	3983
Phygelius rectus Ivory Twist	Masses of bell shaped flowers are produced on this first white flowered Phygelius on stiff stems above green leaves.	3985
Phygelius rectus Moonraker	Masses of soft yellow flowers arranged all around the stems.	3986
Photinia x fraseri Red Robin	In spring the brilliant red new growth appears and makes for a stunning display. Deep greeny-red evergreen foliage continues its year round interest.	3987
Philadelphus sericanthus Silberregen	A compact, round habit, deciduous shrub with ovate green leaves and cup shaped, strawberry scented white flowers.	3988

Philadelphus Snowbelle	A delightful compact shrub making eventually about 4ft. During mid summer the whole shrub is covered in delightful highly fragrant double flowers of the purest white.	3989
Phormium tenax	The well-known 'New Zealand Flax' large strap like leaves from which emerge on occasion tall flower stems which slowly form the dark purple black rather disappointing flower heads.	3990
Philadelphus White Rock	A mix of single or double highly fragrant flowers on a medium sized bush of spreading and gently pendant habit.	3994
Phygelius capensis	The South African 'Cape Figwort' a perfectly hardy small shrub of easy care given a warm sunny spot where it will reward with a continuous display during summer and autumn of orange to red attractive tubular flowers with a yellow throat.	3997
Physocarpus Darts Gold	Bright shining gold foliage that retains it colour over a long period. Makes a relatively compact shrub.	3998
Philadelphus Yellow Hill	Young foliage a warm golden yellow which fade to a more green yellow as summer progresses same fine display of richly fragrant white flowers as one expects from a Philadelphus.	3999
Phygelius aequalis Yellow Trumpet	An attractive evergreen sub-shrub from South Africa, it has small light green leaves and clusters of tubular pale yellow flowers in late summer and early autumn.	4000
Picrasma quassioides	A most unusual small tree related to and not that dissimilar in looks to an Ailanthus with its rather grand pinnate foliage which turn brilliant orange and reds in autumn along with unusual red pea like berries.	4023

Pittosporum tenuifolium Irene Paterson	A low growing form with leaves changing through the season from creamy white to dark green and marbled white and finally in winter the effect added to by a tinge of pink.	4032
Piptanthus nepalensis	A particular favourite, a tall almost evergreen shrub with bright yellow laburnum like flowers set against dark green fingered foliage.	4077
Pistacia chinensis	The Chinese pistachio, makes a large handsome shrub, leaves turn beautiful shades of orange, red and purple.	4084
Pistacia lentiscus	The 'Mastic Tree' makes an attractive tree with leathery pinnate aromatic leaves. Much used in cooking and herbal medicine. Needs winter protection, not fully hardy.	4086

Pittosporum tenuifolium Bannow Bay	Makes a lovely purple and green small evergreen shrub. Originates from Pittosporum Tom Thumb.	4094
Pittosporum Craxten	Not commonly available, makes an excellent evergreen screening subject, small light green leaves, tightly spaced branches. Quickly makes an attractive hedge.	4095
Pittosporum crassifolium Variegatum	A choice evergreen shrub, sage green leaves boldly edged with white.	4096
Pittosporum divaricatum	A shrub with stiffly intertwined branches. Leaves alternate, lanceolate to oval. Flowers are towards the tips of the shoots, very deep red in colour.	4097
Pittosporum tenuifolium Abbotsbury Gold	This is a delightful variegated shrub of columnar habit. Its small undulate leaves have a gold variegation on the young foliage, set against the wonderful black stems. It also has small purple scented flowers in May.	4098

Pittosporum tenuifolium Collaig Silver	Produces a nice compact evergreen shrub with silvery white edged dark green leaves. Makes a good screening plant and useful in seaside locations.	4100

Pittosporum tenuifolium Elizabeth	A good strong growing form with larger than most green and cream white leaves often prettily edged with a strawberry pink during winter.	4101
Pittosporum tenuifolium French Lace	A lovely compact form with wavy edged shiny olive green leaves which turn purple in autumn.	4102
Pittosporum tenuifolium Garnettii	This is a very colourful evergreen shrub of conical habit. Its grey-green leaves have creamy-white margins, and take on pinkish-red spots during the winter. It has small deep purple flowers with a lovely honey fragrance.	4103

Pittosporum tenuifolium Golden King	Very attractive light golden green evergreen leaves with distinctive darker green shading. Makes a very eye catching large shrub or if trimmed makes a very neat and useful hedge subject.	4105
Pittosporum tenuifolium Gold Star	A compact upright form with very attractive young leaves which have a light green centre surrounded by a narrow dark green margin on red coloured young shoots.	4106
Pittosporum tenuifolium Limelight	Green shoots and pale green leaves with a dark green margin, particularly effective in spring when the whole plant is many shades of green.	4107
Pittosporum tenuifolium Mayi	A dense, vigorous, evergreen shrub with small variegated green and white leaves and small black flowers. Originally from New Zealand.	4108
Pittosporum tenuifolium Nuttys Leprechaun	A distinctive variety makes a very slow growing rounded shrub with purple mature foliage contrasting with new seasons bright green leaves.	4109
Pittosporum tenuifolium	Charming large evergreen shrub makes an excellent hedging plant for mild localities. It has small chocolate/purple, honey scented flowers over bright, pale green undulate leaves.	4110
Pittosporum tenuifolium Purpureum	A particular favourite the dark green leaves which as the season progresses slowly turn a deep bronze purple that give them a slightly shiny metallic look.	4111
Pittosporum tenuifolium Tandara Gold	Produces very dainty small leaves, dark green on the edge shaded lighter green and yellow in the centre.	4112
Pittosporum tenuifolium Trims Hedger	Makes an excellent evergreen hedge or screen. A selected form noted for its fast growth.	4113
Pittosporum tenuifolium Tresederi	Small wavy edged leaves, dark green with paler green centres, altogether a very attractive form.	4114
Pittosporum eugenioides	Delightful pale lemon yellow honey scented flowers set amongst glossy mid green leaves. Can makes a small tree but usually seen as a large shrub.	4115
Pittosporum eugenioides Variegata	Makes a very attractive shrub of medium to large size the mid green leaves prettily margined with creamy white.	4116
Pittosporum tenuifolium Variegatum	This large shrub has aromatic glossy green leaves with a creamy-white border. Quite a sight in spring when it produces terminal clusters of pale yellow flowers with a wonderful honey scent. Needs shelter.	4117
Pittosporum tenuifolium Victoria	Makes a good bushy shrub of regular outline, grey green slightly wavy leaves have a thine white margin. The leaves often show shades and flecks of pink in winter.	4118
Pittosporum tenuifolium Wrinkled Blue	A good strong growing form ideal for evergreen hedges or screens. Leaves with a slight wavy wrinkle but imagination needed to detect the blue.	4119
Pittosporum tenuifolium Wendle Channon	Not commonly found and with its attractive variegated foliage it would add well to any collection or garden. Easy to grow and not too fussy.	4120
Pittosporum heterophyllum	Makes an excellent large evergreen shrub with foliage similar to laurel but in spring it really comes into its own with its highly scented creamy whit	4121

Pittosporum tobira Cuneatum	A selected form. Makes a fairly low mound shaped bush up to about 4ft with narrow dark evergreen leaves with delightful fragrant creamy white flowers in summer which turn a pleasing soft yellow as they age.	4123
Pittosporum tobira Variegatum	A very choice variegated shrub mid green leaves with a distinct creamy white margin.	4124
Pittosporum ralphii	An interesting and not often found species from North Island New Zealand. Impressive deep crimson flowers with yellow anthers.	4125
Pittosporum tenuifolium Golden Ball	This new Pittosporum has a combination of gold and lime green evergreen foliage on a naturally bushy, pincushion shaped plant.	6130
Pittosporum tenuifolium Moonlight	A lovely form with attractive dark black branchlets which contrast well with the dark green edged oval shaped leaves which surround greens of several lighter shades and with a central pale golden yellow colour.	4126
Pittosporum tenuifolium Marjory Channon	A lovely form with dark black branches set against attractive light green foliage edged white . Makes an excellent hedge subject for tough dry and windy conditions	4127
Pittosporum tenuifolium Oliver Twist	Makes a compact growing evergreen shrub noted for its bright green foliage and black stems – very eye catching and easy to grow.	5807
Pittosporum tobira	This is an excellent shrub for a warm sunny wall. Although rather slow-growing, it will make a good sized evergreen shrub. It has bright green glossy leaves and in summer produces white scented flowers which turn yellow with age.	4128
Pittosporum tobira Nana	Makes a low bush with chunky light green leaves. Orange blossom scented flowers during height of summer.	4129
Pittosporum tenuifolium Pompom	Pittosporum Pompom is the right name for this compact evergreen that naturally produces a roundish shape of fresh green leaves making it ideal for pot or container growing.	4130
Pittosporum tenuifolium Silver Queen	A well established favourite, the mid green leaves have a silvery sheen and are attractively edged with white.	4131
Pittosporum tenuifolium Tom Thumb	The leaves of this dwarf evergreen shrub are green when young, turning deep red-purple with age.	4132
Pittosporum tenuifolium Warnham Gold	Very effective during winter when the 'Old Gold' foliage stands out well.	4133
Platanus acerifolia Pyramidalis	(Platanus x hispanica 'Pyramidalis'). A fast growing upright form of our London Plane Tree.	4135
Platycrater arguta	Makes a small, broadly rounded, twiggy deciduous shrub. Narrow willow- like green leaves with small teeth along the margins combine well with small white flowers. Originates from China.	4136
Platanus acerifolia Blood Good	A strain of London Plane tree with all the good features of rapid growth, with a good pyramidal outline. Pollution tolerant and of course the well known tapestry of flaking bark on the trunk.	4137
Platanus hispanica (acerifolia)	London Plane Tree, Not only attractive foliage, bark that produces yearly the enquiry is that the tree is diseased? But fabulous seed round seed capsules that hang on long stalks from the branches a bit like ladies ear rings of the past.	4138
Platanus occidentalis	Also known as American Sycamore.	4141
Platanus orientalis Digitata	Very desirable form of this lovely species with attractive deeply divided leaves.	4142
Platanus orientalis	The Chennar tree or Oriental plane. A large tree of spreading habit long cultivated in this country. Attractive and recognizable dappled grey peeling bark.	4143

Plumbago auriculata (P.capensis)	The Cape Leadwort. Beautiful sky-blue flowers through late Summer and Autumn.	4169
Philadelphus maculatus Mexican Jewel	Recently introduced and as its name suggests originates from Mexico. Intensely fragrant pendant white flowers. Prefers a sheltered site.	4194
Populus nigra betulifolia (Female)	An extremely rare form of the already threatened native Black Poplar. Our trees originate from a single tree growing on the marshes of the nearby river Deben.	4195
Populus candicans Aurora	A very attractive Poplar with its pretty creamy white variegated foliage which is pink tinged when the new foliage appears. Like many Poplars this makes a fast strong growing tree.	4196
Populus canadensis Robusta	Makes a large fast growing tree of upright habit. Originally bred in France at the end of the 1800's. Unlike many Poplars dislikes wet waterlogged soils preferring drier but moist conditions.	4197
Potentilla fruticosa Daphne	A rare Potentilla makes a smallish shrub with a good display of golden yellow flowers.	4203
Potentilla fruticosa Abbotswood	A dwarf form of spreading habit, it has dark green leaves and plenty of attractive small showy white flowers.	4204
Potentilla fruticosa var arbuscula	Large golden yellow flowers throughout summer and early autumn. Distinctive brown shaggy barked branchlets. Makes a dwarf shrub.	4205

Robinia pseudoacacia Pyramidalis	A fastigiate form of the False Acacia, with spineless erect branches and scented white leguminous flowers.	4750
Robinia pseudoacacia Twisty Babe (Lace Lady)	A curious form with a mass of twisted leaves and branches and surprisingly rather attractive. Very effective as a small tree in a container. Also called Lace Lady which I think as a name fits its character a little better.	4751
Robinia pseudoacacia Tortuosa	A very attractive slow growing small tree with twisted and curled branches- for lovers of the curious.	4752
Robinia slavinii Hillieri	A form bred by the famous Hillier nursery in Hampshire about 1930. A small tree of roundish outline with fine feathery foliage and attractive lilac pink flowers.	4786

Rubus Benenden	Raised by Capt. Collingwood Ingram in 1950, makes a large shrub up to about 3m thornless arching branches covered with lovely pure white rose shaped flowers in May.	4826
Rubus calycinoides	Near evergreen ground-cover, attractive light green roundish crinkle edged foliage which darkens with age to achieve a two toned low growing carpet especially effective in autumn and winter when it takes on eye-catcing plum purple hues.	4827
Rubus calophyllus	A rare a rather beautiful shrub with large bold corrugated silky haired leaves giving an overall striking silver effect. Good in dry shade but needs siting well to give winter protection as not fully hardy.	4828
Rubus cockburnianus	A strong growing shrub with attractive ferny pinnate foliage gives way to purplish stems covered by a vivid white bloom. Used very effectively in the Cambridge Botanic's winter garden.	4829
Rubus cockburniananus Golden Vale	As its parent with striking white stems in winter but with the benefit of attractive golden foliage in summer. Lower growing and more refined, less invasive.	4830
Rubus Betty Ashburner	"Ornamental Bramble". Thrives as ground-cover under trees, on building sites, banks and all difficult areas. Flowers white during summer. Prune anytime.	4831
Rubus lineatus	Often seen as a semi evergreen with very attractive and very different looking leaves that are white felted beneath. White flowers not especially showy but followed by attractive small red or yellow fruits in autumn.	4832
Rubus phoenicolasius (Wineberry)	Rubus phoenicolasius as well as making an attractive strong growing ornamental shrub is also called Wineberry and noted for its delicious sweet orange red coloured fruits in late summer.	4834
Rubus spectabilis Olympic Double	A very impressive plant with its large double deep rose red flowers, a strong grower, perfect for the wilder garden.	4835
Rubus tricolor	A particularly useful low growing evergreen shrub producing long trailing stems that form swathes of green and red tinged foliage with a white felted underside. Happy in sun or shade.	4836
Rubus thibetanus Silver Fern	A very pretty form making low mounds of silvery grey cut leaved foliage, the stems covered with a white bloom which is highly effective in winter.	4837
Ruscus aculeatus	Quite an unusual native shrub useful in extreme shady spots where other plants would fail to grow. Stiff crowded leaves and sharp spine like tips, used to scrub down the wooden butchers blocks of old, hence its common	4846
