Callicarpa american var lactea	The white berried form of the American Beauty Bush and equally as stunning.	965
Carpinus betulus A. Beeckman	An interesting hornbeam growing initially upright and then broadening with age.	966
Carpinus betulus Chantry Farm Selection		967
Carpinus betulus Columnaris	A very distinctive tree of upright and compact habit smaller and slower growing than Fastigiata.	968
Carpinus betulus Lucas	A new cultivar. A compact, narrow growing tree. Bigger and darker leaves than other cultivars turning golden yellow in autumn.	969
Carpinus betulus Pendula	Makes a small squat tree with cascades of strongly weeping branches.	970
Carpinus betulus Rockhampton Red	A splendid tall growing Hornbeam, quite unique superb autumn colours of red in a variety of hues.	971
Callicarpa bodinieri Profusion	Distinguished by its bronze purple young foliage. One of the joys of late summer flowering shrubs. Lilac flowers followed by eye catching clusters of intense violet coloured fruits.	973
Carpenteria californica Elizabeth	A selection from the USA with even larger and perhaps even more golden yellow flowers produced in abundance.	974
Carpinus caroliniana Sentinel Dries	A rare selection of the N. American Hornbeam displaying fantastic autumn colours. Narrow in outline.	975
Callistemon citrinus White Anzac	A smaller growing Bottlebrush up to about a 1 metre. Unsurprisingly Callistemon White Anzac produces white flowers which make a good change from the usual reds and yellows.	976
Caryopteris clandonensis First Choice	This superb form of Caryopteris should indeed be your first Choice if you are looking for a small shrub with gorgeous deep rich blue flowers covering the bush in late summer and autumn.	977
Caryopteris clandonensis Grand Bleu	Of French origin. A reliable plant producing exceptionally deep blue flowers in late summer.	978
Caryopteris clandonensis Petit Bleu	A compact and low growing variety with superbly deep violet blue flowers.	979
Carya cordiformis	One the best for ease of cultivation makes eventually a largish tree. Noted for its unusual yellow winter buds. From N America introduced around the 1760's.	981
Caesalpinia gilliesii	For the plant connoisseur, a most uncommon large shrub from Argentina. It has very dainty fern-like foliage and spectacular flowers in long, erect racemes of rich yellow and scarlet stamens.	983
Caryopteris clandonensis Ferndown	A very popular small shrub which can be kept to a height of 60cm. It has lovely aromatic leaves and beautiful violet-blue flowers in summer.	985
Caryopteris clandonensis Heavenly Blue	Similar to 'Ferndown' but slightly more compact and with flowers of a slightly darker shade.	990
Caryopteris incana Delft Blue	Produces a lovely low hummock of aromatic grey green foliage topped in late summer by a mass of rich blue flowers. Easy to grow and happy in sunny dry situations.	991
Camellia japonica Apollo	A good strong and reliable camelia with blood red semi double flowers freely produced.	992
Camellia japonica Blood of China	A strong grower of compact growth with striking deep red semi- double flowers with conspicuous yellow stamens.	993

Camellia japonica Coquettii	A lovely form of upright and compact habit. Produces a good display of deep rose coloured red semi double flowers.	994
Camellia japonica Elegans	Camellia Elegans has been in cultivation since the early 1800's and still a popular and reliable performer with exceptionally large deep pink flowers of the attractive anemone type form. Makes a good sized spreading bush.	995
Camellia japonica Jupiter	An excellent choice if looking for a strong growing camellia with consistent display of bright scarlet semi double flowers.	996
Camellia japonica Kimberley	Camellia Kimberley produces a very strong growing compact plant with neat single cup shaped attractive bright red flowers.	997
Camellia japonica Lady Campbell	A good vigorous compact grower with deep velvet red rose form flowers.	998

Camellia japonica Alba Plena	Good upright growth. Superb large white double flowers, one of the best white flowering camellias.	1000
Camellia japonica Mathotiana Alba	A real show stopping white flowered variety with very large pure white flowers consisting of many rows of interlocking petals, known as formal double.	1001
Camellia japonica Moshe Dayan	Glossy evergreen foliage set off perfectly the good sized creamy white double flowers.	1002
Camellia japonica Mikenjaku (Nagasaki)	Also known as C. Nagasaki. Deep rose pink flowers randomly splashed with white.	1003
Camellia japonica Nuccios Gem	Another lovely white flowered variety Camellia Nuccios Gem lives up to its reputation as a good free flowering shrub producing fine displays of good sized white flowers.	1004
Camellia japonica Niobé	A striking medium sized Clematis, with velvety ruby-red petals and lime-green stamens.	1005
Camellia japonica Nobilissima	One of the earliest white flowered types to flower. Camellia Nobilissima is a strong growing form and upright habit. The medium sized white flowers posses an attractive gold yellow hue.	1006
Camellia japonica Nuccios Pearl	A splendid white flowered variety producing medium sized double flowers faintly flushed with pink.	1007
Camellia japonica Tristrem Carlyon	A strong growing camellia with lovely pink peony form flowers.	1008
Camellia japonica Volunteer	A rather beautiful recent introduction, keeps to a good compact shape, superb display of pink flowers with a lighter dusty pink edge to the petals which becomes even more pronounced as it ages.	1009
Caryopteris clandonensis Kew Blue	Raised at Kew in 1945, it is a seedling of 'Arthur Simmonds'. Similar to 'Ferndown' with flowers a slightly different shade of violet.	1010
Camellia japonica Kramers Supreme	A superb variety with exceptionally large peony form vivid red flowers, often with a delicate slight fragrance.	1011
Callicarpa americana	Not often seen in the UK medium sized shrub of rather loose open habit making it ideal for back of a border. Its claim to fame has to be the spectacular violet coloured berries produced in great abundance during late summer.	1013
Callicarpa bodinieri	Native to China, this deciduous shrub produces small lilac flowers against dark green leaves that turn to red in autumn and are followed by decorative purple berries.	1015
Callistemon viminalis Captian Cook	Makes a small evergreen shrub, slightly weeping habit with good display of bright red 'bottle brush' flowers.	1016
Sinocalycanthus chinensis	Closely related to Calycanthus and which it was originally included. Introduced quite recently in 1983 from E. China. Attractive pink flushed white flowers with pale yellow centres during June.	1017

Callistemon citrinus Splendens	A really excellent form with dazzling bright scarlet Bottle Brush-like flowers all through the summer, ideally suited to a warm sunny spot with good drainage.	1018
Callicarpa dichotoma	A little different to most other Callicarpas offered. Makes a compact shrub with lovely pink flowers in July followed by deep lilac fruits.	1020
Calycanthus floridus	'Sweetshrub'.	1021
Callistemon Red Clusters	Callistemon Red Clusters is a particularly striking red flowered form. Hardier than many Callistemon.	1023
Callistemon linearis	Narrow green leaves and masses of scarlet bottle brush flowers. Needs a warm sheltered site to perform well. Introduced from New South Wales in late 1700's.	1024
Calycanthus occidentalis	A Californian form of Allspice, with dark green glossy leaves which have a spicy aroma. Over the summer, it bears large deep red-brown flowers.	1025
Callistemon pallidus	Anyone who has seen this "Bottlebrush" in flower will not forget the effect. The distinctive flowers have delightful creamy yellow flowers. Not recommended though for shallow chalky soils.	1027
Callistemon salignus	One of the hardiest of the 'Bottlebrushes' and no less beautiful with willow like green leaves and flowers of the palest yellow.	1028
Callistemon sieberi (pityoides)	A hardy species, produces small yellow bottlebrushes set against narrow grey green foliage.	1029
Callistemon viridiflorus	Of the 'Bottlebrushes' this is one of the hardiest. Medium size with attractive pointed foliage often pink flushed when young and of course those fabulous 'Bottle Brush' like flowers in this case a charming soft yellow.	1031
Calluna vulgaris Mixed	Common heather, ling, or simply heather, is the sole species in the genus Calluna in the flowering plant family Ericaceae.	6046
Camptotheca acuminata	A tree of medium size, unusual yellow flowers. Well worth a sheltered spot to any collector of rare plants. Currently under research for cancer treatments.	1032

Camellia Inspiration	A good reliable performer with deep pink flowers.	1036
Camellia japonica Adolphe Audusson	A first class and popular Camellia reliably giving its display of deep blood red semi double flowers in late winter. Good dark evergreen foliage and sturdy growth.	1037
Camellia japonica Brushfield's Yellow	Superb creamy yellow ruffled central petals surrounded by white outer petals. Quite stunning.	1038

Camellia sinensis	Grow yourselves some tea. The actual plant that your cup of tea comes from. Makes a large evergreen shrub or small tree with smallish greeny yellow flowers.	1050
Camellia williamsii Brigadoon	Semi-double rose pink flowers. Makes a medium sized shrub of upright habit.	1054
Camellia japonica William Bartlett	A very beautiful cultivar with light pink double flowers with slight streaks of lipstick red.	1055

Caragana arborescens Lorbergii	Extremely narrow almost threadlike leaves and small yellow pea like flowers. A very distinctive shrub of relatively slow growth.	1069
Caragana arborescens Pendula	A lovely weeping form of 'The Pea Tree' with the usual display of yellow pea like flowers.	1070
Caragana arborescens	A beautiful and resilient shrubby tree from Siberia. Its pinnate leaves provide a lovely backdrop for the yellow pea-like flowers which are borne in early summer. Perfect for exposed sites and dry soils.	1071

Caragana aurantiaca	A lovely and rather choice dwarf form of the Siberian Pea Tree. In early summer the whole bush is covered with delightful primrose yellow flowers.	1072
Caragana arborescens Walker	Makes a small weeping tree. A Canadian raised hybrid inheriting characteristics of its parents C. Lorbergii and C. Pendula.	1073
Carpinus betulus Chelmondiston Selection	A splendid local tree growing on a farm at Chelmondiston on the Suffolk Shotley peninsula within sight of the river Orwell, its from this tree we collect seed to propagate our young local grown trees.	1074
Carpinus betulus Purpurea	An uncommon form of Hornbeam, it's young leaves are purple, maturing to green.	1075
Carpinus betulus	The Common Hornbeam is a classic native hedgerow plant which retains its russet coloured leaves through most of the winter. Often used in place of Beech, especially on heavy soils.	1076
Carpinus betulus Fastigiata	(Pyramidalis) Makes a tall upright column, pyramidal in outline.	1077
Carpenteria californica	Tree Anemone, without doubt a most beautiful evergreen shrub of medium size with glorious large pure white flowers and bright golden central anthers.	1078
Carpinus caroliniana	This form of Hornbeam is a rare sight in the UK. Carpinus caroliniana has pronounced fluted bark a greeny grey in colour. The trunk is often twisted into sculptural shapes and supports a wide canopy of branches that weep gently at their tips.	1079
Caryopteris clandonensis Dark Knight	A good selected form with very deep purple flowers and extra silvery foliage.	1080

Caryopteris clandonensis Summer Sorbet	A must for all lovers of golden variegated foliage, contrasting stunningly with the deep blue flowers.	1082
Carpinus fangiana	Most certainly a Hornbeam for the enthusiastic collector and plants man/ woman A recent introduction from SW China around the 2990's. Bronzy red young foliage which mature to show the many prominent leaf veins.	1083

Carpinus betulus Frans Fontaine	Selected originally from a street tree found in Eindhoven in the Netherlands, makes an impressive tall column of a tree..	1085
Carissa macrocarpa	A small growing spiny shrub produces edible red fruits known as 'num-num' in its local South Africa. A very good plant for seaside conditions tolerating salt laden winds.	6066
Carya glabra	Makes a medium sized tree with attractive foliage similar to that of the common walnut. Lovely yellow autumn leaf colour.	1086
Carpinus henryana	A collectors tree introduced from China in 1907 by the famous plant hunter Ernest Wilson. Makes a medium sized tree of balanced shape and outline.	1087
Callistemon rigidus	Dark red bottle brush flowers set amongst the expected dark green narrow foliage.	1088
Carya illinoensis	The Pecan Nut. Attractive pinnate foliage. Sadly not very reliable nut production in this country.	1089
Carpinus japonica	Makes only a small tree of wide spreading habit, attractive corrugated leaves.	1090
Carpinus coreana	The Korean Hornbeam A rare and sought-after tree introduced by Sir Harold Hillier in 1976. Makes a small bushy tree with serrated glossy mid green leaves. Much admired for bonsai.	1091
Caragana microphylla	Makes a spreading shrub with bright yellow flowers in summer. Introduced from N. China around 1790.	1092

Carya ovata	A medium to largish tree with considerable handsome qualities. Attractive finger like foliage turning good autumn colours of deep yellow.	1095
Carpinus polyneura	A really lovely species and a very collectable hornbeam with its relatively narrow sharply toothed leaves which finish with a long point. The young leaves a striking reddish bronze followed by the usual autumn delights.	1097
Carpinus schuschaensis	Discovered by Roy Lancaster a recently introduced naturally occurring hybrid quickly making in time a medium sized tree of upright growth. Glossy green sharply toothed leaves on conspicuous red stalks.	1100
Carmichaelia stevensonii	A rare and unusual broom like plant from New Zealand. The whip like stems look almost lifeless. Eventually the plant here in our collection flowered after nearly 20 years producing a number of very pale pink small flowers.	1101
Caryopteris clandonensis Sterling Silver	Not only does Caryopteris Sterling Silver have the beautiful blue flowers so admired of Caryopteris but also this new form has silvery aromatic foliage.	1102
Carya tomentosa	The Big-bud hickory as its name suggests buds are larger than most of its kind. Fragrant and attractive foliage turning clear butter yellows in autumn.	1105

Carpinus tschonoskii	A very rare Hornbeam, also known as Chonosukis Hornbeam.	1106
Carpinus turczaninowii	Another rare and not commonly offered Hornbeam, makes a small shrubby tree with exceptionally small leaves for the type which are a superb bright red on first appearing.	1107
Castanea sativa Albomarginata	Lovely form with white edged leaves, sometimes completely white. The spines on the fruit husks are often white as well. The fruit is edible.	1108
Castanea sativa Chantry Farm Selection		1109
Castanea sativa Variegata (Aureomarginata)	This form of the Sweet Chestnut although slow growing is perfect if looking for a larger tree with variegated foliage, Castanea sativa Variegata will eventually achieve a height of around 20m.	1111
Cornus alba Siberian Pearls	A stunning site when the white berries tinged with just a hint of blue are set against the traditional red of the species.	1113
Castanea mollissima	.	1114
Castanea sativa	The Sweet Chestnut. This familiar tree was probably brought to Britain with the Romans who used the branches as support for their vines. Makes a large imposing tree with fascinating spiral fluted bark.	1115
Catalpa bignonioides Aurea	The Golden Indian Bean Tree has irresistible large Golden yellow leaves providing just the right exotic touch to any scene. Avoid windy sites which would damage the beautiful foliage. Catalpas originate from N. America.	1116
Catalpa bignonioides	The Indian Bean Tree has large heart shaped leaves which gives the foliage an exotic effect. Foxglove like flowers of white, yellow with a purple stain in July and August, followed by strings of bean like pods.	1117
Catalpa bungei	Makes a small tree with large leaves and attractive white flowers with purple spots. Best sited in a warm sunny spot.	1118
Catalpa bignonioides Variegata	Very much the gem, smaller growing than the type, foliage with attractive variegation ranging from white to a light cream.	1119
Catalpa erubescens Purpurea	A very fine hybrid between C. bignonioides C. ovata introduced around 1869. For lovers of purple plants, it has deep purple foliage and young shoots.	1120
Catalpa ovata	A lovely small tree, some bit smaller than its better known cousin Catalpa bignonioides Attractive 3 lobed leaves and white flowers with red and yellow markings in clusters.	1122
Cassinia vauvilliersii var albida	Produces heads of small, showy white flowers in dense clusters on top of small grey leaves. Evergreen.	1124

Caryopteris Weeping Form	A most desirable and unusual form which is spectacular if trained as a small tree with its cascading grey silver foliage and masses of sky blue flowers in high summer.	1125
Camellia williamsii E G Waterhouse	Makes a medium size evergreen bush of upright habit. Flowers double and delicate shade of pink.	1126
Camellia williamsii Anticipation	A wonderful and well known camellia of the famous williamsii types. Very large deep pink flowers cover the bush in succession from mid winter to spring. A satisfaction guaranteed type of camellia.	1128
Camellia williamsii Debbie	Camellia Debbie produces very large beautiful clear pink flowers of the peony form type. Quite memorable when seen in all her glory.	1129
Camellia williamsii Donation	Still grown by the thousand an ever popular and reliable Camelia of relatively easy cultivation. Beautiful semi double large clear pink flowers on good deep green foliage.	1130
Camellia williamsii Elsie Jury	One of the hybrids raised by J.C. Williams in the 1920s, a very beautiful hybrid with rose pink toned paeony like flowers.	1131
Camellia williamsii Ruby Wedding	Deep glowing wine red ruffled flowers set amongst smart glossy green leaves. The perfect Ruby wedding gift or for that matter perfect anytime	1132
Camellia williamsii J.C. Williams	Evergreen shrub that produces pastel pink, cup shaped flowers from winter into spring.	1133
Caryopteris clandonensis Worcester Gold	Attractive yellow gold of the new foliage combines well with the mid bluey flowers.	1134

Ceanothus arboreus Trewithen Blue	If you are looking for a Ceanothus to grow into a small tree then this is the one, stunningly beautiful when in spring the deep blue slightly scented flowers cover the branches. Originated at Trewithien Gardens in Cornwall.	1136
Ceanothus Concha	This is a dense, medium sized shrub with arching branches and dark narrow leaves. In summer it is covered in conspicuous red buds, followed by clusters of deep blue flowers.	1137
Ceanothus Southmead	A first rate medium sized ceanothus with glossy evergreen leaves and intense blue flowers in early summer.	1138
Ceanothus Autumnal Blue	Probably one of the most reliable and hardy Ceanothus. Evergreen foliage and masses of deep sky blue flowers appearing often from spring until the autumn.	1143
Ceanothus veitchianus	Well tried and tested, Ceanothus veitchianus makes an impressive large shrub of relatively fast growth. Small dark green evergreen foliage with masses of deep blue flowers in May and June.	1144
Ceanothus Blue Cushion	A deservedly very popular ceanothus. Makes a low spreading mound of evergreen foliage covered by startling electric blue flowers during early summer.	1145
Ceanothus Blue Mound	A dense and bushy form of Californian Lilac, this popular plant has dark green glossy leaves. It produces dense clusters of bright blue flowers in early summer and again in early autumn. A very useful garden shrub.	1146
Ceanothus Burkwoodii	An excellent performing Ceanothus flowers of a rich deep blue throughout summer and autumn. Dense habit, small glossy green leaves.	1147
Cercis canadensis Forest Pansy	A much sought after form of The North American Redbud with its deep claret red foliage and pink flowers. Makes a large shrub or small tree.	1148
Cercis canadensis Hearts of Gold	This form of Cercis has the most appropriate name, Cercis canadensis Hearts of Gold describes the leaf on this Cercis so well it is hard to say much more than, the golden heart shaped leaf and the purple pink pea like purple flowers.	1149
Cercis canadensis Ruby Falls	Another fine foliage tree.	1150

Ceanothus Dark Star	A medium sized evergreen ceanothus with gently sweeping arched branches laden when in flower with intense purple blue honey scented flowers. Received an Award of Merit in 2002.	1151
Ceanothus delileanus Henri Desfosse	Large bunches of rich deep blue flowers produced in quantity. Makes a medium sized shrub and easy to grow.	1159
Ceanothus Gloire de Versailles	Perhaps the most popular deciduous Californian Lilac, it has large clusters of powder blue flowers in summer and autumn.	1163
Ceratostigma griffithii	A lovely form, deep blue flowers over a long period of late summer and autumn, leaves also acquire a shade of red, a very effective combination.	1164
Ceanothus Italian Skies	Deep blue flowers and small dark green leaves on a medium sized spreading shrub.	1165
Cercidiphyllum japonicum Pendulum	This beautiful and unusual weeping form of the Katsura Tree has the lovely red tinted leaves of the Katsura tree in spring which slowly fades and turn green in summer.	1166
Cercidiphyllum japonicum Rotfuchs (Red Fox)	This beautiful form of Cercidiphyllum has very dark purple to red leaf colour in summer followed by yellow, orange autumn colour (on more mature trees).	1167
Celtis australis	One of the Hackberries or Nettle Trees, so called because of the look and feel of their leaves but without the sting. Fast growing and suited to a wide range of conditions.	1168
Celtis julianae	"This beautiful tall tree is easily recognized by its handsome foliage which is glossy above and pubescent beneath. In spring conspicuous red flower buds clothe the branches. Native to Central China but extremely rare in cultivation in UK".	1171
Celtis occidentalis	The 'Hackberry' is a medium sized tree of the Elm family. Mature plants have a rough, corky bark and a multitude of black berries in autumn.	1172
Celtis tournefortii	An uncommon Hackberry and not often seen. Makes a small tree with green polished leaves and red and yellow fruits.	1176
Ceanothus Marie Simon	A medium sized shrub producing delightful pink flowers on the new young growth.	1177
Cestrum cultum Cretan Purple	Needs a conservatory or very sheltered site where if happy will produce a sumptuous display of deep red purple flowers over long period in late summer.	1185
Ceanothus pallidus Perle Rose	A quite stunning flower colour so unexpected on a ceanothus of bright ruby rose red during the height of summer.	1186
Betula pendula Royal Frost	This lovely form of Birch has rich purple leaves, similar colour to that of purple beech and in time has a cinnamon white smooth stem. Autumn colour on Betula pendula Royal Frost has to be one of the most interesting of all Betulas.	1187
Ceratostigma plumbaginoides	Another lovely late flowering shrub beautiful china blue flowers and wonderful autumnal foliage colour.	1189
Cephalanthus occidentalis	A lovely deciduous large shrub or small tree. Rarely offered for sale. Glossy green leaves with clustered heads of small spherical creamy white flowers during late summer. Originates from Eastern and Southern USA.	1190
Ceanothus Puget Blue	Makes a medium sized shrub with small evergreen leaves set off by the intense deep blue flowers over a long flowering period in early summer.	1191
Cercis canadensis	The North American Redbud. Very similar to the more common Judas tree C. siliquastrum but somewhat less floriferous.	1192
Cercis chinensis Avondale	A very popular and much sort after plant of New Zealand origin producing deeper than average buds and flowers. Foliage a good mid green and the usual heart shaped.	1193

Ceanothus thrysiflorous repens	'Creeping Blue Blossom' is a vigorous, mound forming shrub which is covered in bright blue flowers in early summer. A reliable performer.	1196
Cercis reniformis Texas White	A stunning tree, producing large clusters of white flowers on bare branches. Heart shaped leaves emerge after flowering and turn golden yellow in autumn.	1197

Cercidiphyllum japonicum	The Katsura Tree, makes a small to medium sized tree, attractive foliage that turns pale yellow and pink in the autumn, its great claim to fame however comes from the sweet scent in autumn that reminds one of burnt sugar.	1198
Cercidiphyllum magnificum	A rare and rather lovely form of the Katsura tree. Makes a well shaped smallish tree of naturally pyramidal outline. Bold heart shaped green leaves larger than the type turn gentle yellow and orange in autumn.	1199
Cercocarpus montana	A unusual plant not often seen in the UK. Makes a large shrub to small tree with alder like leaves.	1200
Cercis occidentalis	Western Redbud originating from south west United States. A large shrub or occasionally a small tree with the usual rose pink coloured flowers but not especially free flowering.	1201
Cercis siliquastrum Alba	Much sought after, the white flowering form of the Judas Tree.	1202
Ceratonia siliqua	An interesting large shrub occasionally small tree for the collector of the unusual. Ceratonia siliqua commonly known as the Carob tree has attractive pinnate foliage of dark green leaves.	1203
Cercis siliquastrum	The 'Judas tree' is fabled to be the tree that Judas hung himself from. This apart, it is a lovely small tree. It has heart shaped leaves and deep pink flowers in May.	1204
Ceratostigma willmott. Desert Skies	If happy and growing well will reward you with a delightful combination of blue flowers and bright golden yellow foliage.	1206
